Learning opportunities are everywhere. You can make anything a learning experience for your child, just follow the TRUST ideas.

Take turns to make	'You think that we should have fish fingers for dinner?
plans and predictions	That's better than my pizza plan.'
before starting a task	'I wonder how many fish fingers everyone would like. What do you think?'
Recap to check ideas and understanding as your child is helping	'So, you think that we should dig the hole here? Why is that?' 'Why do you think that the tower fell over when you added the last block?'
Use encouragement	'I love your ideas for grandma's picture. Let's collect what we need
and praise to keep	and make it.'
children engaged in learning	'You thought so carefully about your picture. I wonder how it would look with stars on. What do you think?
Share prior knowledge	'Have you learnt about things that float at school? Do you think that this bottle
